





Number of Child Care Providers by Type





Number of Available Slots for Children by Provider Type







Number of Inspections Completed by Regional Licensing Offices



What is Our Why for Maryland Prekindergarten Expansion?



- The results of an analysis on the long-term effects of prekindergarten programs indicate that enrollment in prekindergarten has a positive effect on the participants' school performance through elementary and middle school.
- The findings also suggest that participation in prekindergarten programs significantly reduces the number of children who were identified as having disabilities or placement in special education.

What MUST and what MAY a Private Provider participate in?

<u>MUST</u>- There is no required participation in the PreK Expansion Grant Program or the Blueprint Program.

MAY- participate in the PreK Expansion Grant Program in FY23-25

MAY- participate in the Maryland State Prekindergarten Program:

FY23-25 Transitional Blueprint Program and funding

FY 26-30 Blueprint Program and funding

What is the Maryland State Prekindergarten Program that Public and Private Providers MAY participate in?



- FY 23-25- A free full day program for three- and four-year-old children who are from families that are below 300% of the FPL (Tier I)
- Beginning FY 26- A full day program for 4 year-old children between 300 and 600% of the FPL (Tier II) and above 600% of the FPL (Tier III). School systems may choose to collect the family share using the State Sliding Scale.
- Provides high-quality learning experiences to help children develop and maintain the knowledge, skills, and behaviors necessary to be successful in school.
- Provides appropriate experiences that address the needs of young children in the areas of language and literacy, mathematics, social foundations, science, social studies, fine arts, and physical well-being and motor development



Strengthening Families

Strengthening Families™ is a researchinformed approach to increase family strengths, enhance child development, and reduce the likelihood of child abuse and neglect. It is based on engaging families, programs, and communities in building five protective factors:

- Parental resilience
- Social connections
- Knowledge of parenting and child development
- Concrete support in times of need
- Social and emotional competence of children


Using the Strengthening Families framework, more than 30 states are shifting policy and practice to help programs working with children and families focus on protective factors. States apply the Strengthening Families approach in early childhood, child welfare, child abuse prevention, and other child and family serving systems.



CBCAP Funds

Funds must be used to support:

Primary Prevention

Universal programs and strategies which are available to all families.



Secondary Prevention

Targeted prevention efforts, which target children and families at risk for abuse or neglect.







CBCAP Prevention Focused Program Activities

Offer assistance to families.

Promote the development of parenting skills.

Involve parents in the planning and implementation of the lead agency and local programs.

Increase family stability.


Improve family access to formal and informal resources.
