#### Child Care Scholarships

July, 2018:

Provider Reimbursement Raised to the 20th percentile

**August, 2018:** 

**Income Eligibility Level Increased to 65% SMI** 


July, 2019:

Provider Reimbursement Raised to the 30th percentile

July, 2020:

Provider Reimbursement Will Rise to the 60th percentile








#### Public PreK

- Prekindergarten Supplemental Grants \$58 million
- Prekindergarten *Expansion* Grants \$26.6 million
  - Plus another \$20 million in the Governor's budget







## Supporting the Early Childhood Workforce





### Maryland Child Care Credential Program

- Recognizes child care educators for exceeding State licensing requirements through –
  - Professional development
  - Training
  - Earning degrees or certifications
- The program provides one-time or annual stipends
- 10,220 teachers and 210 administrators currently participate.
- \$4 million in the Governor's budget



### Child Care Career and Professional Development Fund (CCCPDF)

- The program covers tuition for child care educators to pursue an Associate of Arts (A.A.) or Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) degree.
- 22 Maryland Colleges/Universities participate.
- 352 students pursuing an A.A. and 109 pursuing a B.A.
- \$5 million in the Governor's budget
  - Plus adding support for CDAs



# **Improving**Program Quality





### Maryland EXCELS

- Maryland's Quality Rating and Improvement System provides a pathway for continuous quality improvement.
- 4,659 licensed and registered child care facilities and public school PreK programs are participating.
- 57% of all child care programs in the state participate.
- \$5 million in the Governor's budget




#### **Infants & Toddlers**

- Family-centered system of early intervention services for young children with developmental delays and disabilities, and their families.
- In 2017, more than 68% of children who received early intervention services were enrolled in general education by third through sixth grade.
- 98% of families report that early intervention services have helped them understand their rights, communicate effectively about their child's needs, and help their child develop and learn.
- \$2 million more in the Governor's budget.



# Promoting a 2-Gen Approach





### Judy Center Early Learning Hubs (Judy Centers)

- 53 Judy Centers provide high-quality early childhood education programs and comprehensive support services for children birth through kindergarten and their families.
- Judy Centers are marking their 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary and holding celebrations throughout the year.
- Data shows students who participated in Judy Center activities do better on the KRA than those who do not.
- \$2.5 million for 10 new Judy Centers.
- \$4 million more for current Judy Centers.



### Family Support Centers (FSC)

- 17 state-funded FSC make up a network of 24 across the state for pregnant families and children birth to age three.
- 2,000 families served annually in the Network.
- \$2 million for 6 new FSC.
- \$1 million more for current FSC.



Total Increase of \$76.5 Million or 26% over FY20 Funding
