Scissors (blunt tip)	To cut gauze and bandages to size.
Soap (liquid, fragrance-free)	To clean injured area.
Adhesive Tape (hypo-allergenic)	To hold gauze bandages to size.
Thermometer (digital non-touch) or fever strip, non-	To measure body temperature. No rectal
glass, non-mercury thermometer	check.
Triangular bandage (pre-made or	To immobilize body parts as a sling or a tie
40"x40"x64" piece of clean cotton cloth)	for a splint; To hold dressing on large

Tweezers	To remove splinters, ticks.
Washcloths (disposable)	To clean injured area.
Paper/plastic bag	To hold cloths, gauze, and other materials.
Whistle	For attention and seek help.

If you suspect that a child has been exposed to toxic substances, or any potential poisoning emergency, call Poison Control immediately! Follow all instructions given by Poison Control. Do <u>not</u> induce vomiting unless you are instructed to do so. **POISON CONTROL: 410 529-7701 (Metropolitan Baltimore) or 1-800-222-1222 (Maryland only, toll-free)**

Call 911 for life-threatening emergency incidents, whenever epinephrine is administered, and when a child is missing or in danger.

Note: It is important to remember that a first aid kit should be used in conjunction with first aid and CPR training. Being trained on how to use all the tools in a first aid kit will reduce the severity of injuries and save lives. A well-stocked kit is only as good as long as there is a trained staff who knows how to use them. First aid supplies are to be kept in a location which is convenient and easily accessible. First aid supplies are to be available at the child care facility and on all outdoor/field trips/transportation. First aid kits or supplies should be restocked after use/expired. A monthly inventory log should be kept with the name/signature of the staff member who completed the inventory.

Recommended Additional Items:

- 1. A standard first aid chart or equivalent first aid guide/card/sheet for reference (received during first aid training)
- 2. Pocket face mask to perform rescue breathing during CPR
- 3. One working non-pay telephone or wireless communication device (cell phone & charger).
- 4. Pen/pencil and note pad for recording emergency events for use on field trips
- 5. For each child -Name, DOB, emergency phone numbers for parents, allergies or medical alerts, list of current medications
- 6. Emergency medication for children with special needs (as approved and provided by parents).
- 7. Telephone numbers of the poison control center, paramedics, and other emergency numbers, Licensing office
- 8. Purchased bottled water (replace once opened and expired).
