<p>Welcome and Opening Remarks</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Christina Peusch welcomed everyone to the meeting. ● Minutes have been sent out and approved. ● Christina Peusch has asked to limit the conversation to our council first and then open it up to guests. 	
<p>Review Guidelines/Goals of Council</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● The Chairperson offered a reminder of the purpose of the OCC Advisory Council: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Advise and counsel the OCC; ○ Review regulations proposed by state agencies regulating child care; ○ Review issues and problems relating to care of children and suggested priorities for consideration by the OCC; and ○ Identify interdepartmental issues of importance to child care providers and users that should be addressed by the OCC and other State agencies. ● The Council meetings are “open” meetings but not “public” hearings. What this means is that the meeting is open to anyone who would like to attend. However, it is not a “public” meeting, in that the topics of discussion are limited to only those items on the Agenda. OCC Advisory Council meetings are not the appropriate forum to share concerns or complaints. ● The Agenda for each meeting is set prior to the meeting, in consultation between the Department and the Chairperson for the Council. A Council member who would like to have an item considered for the agenda should make the request no later than two weeks prior to the meeting by contacting Tara Bartosz at tara.bartosz@maryland.gov or Christina Peusch, mcca1@comcast.net. The Department will share information as specified on the Agenda set for the meeting. ● After all items on the Agenda are concluded, the Council meeting will be opened to “Other Business.” This will allow for discussion of items not necessarily related to those on the Agenda. To ensure an equal amount of time for participation, each speaker will be asked to limit their thoughts and comments to no more than three minutes. Comments made during this time should be succinct, specific and of interest to the Council members.

OCC Director report	<p>Departures for the Division of Early Childhood at MSDE:</p> <p>Jennifer Nizer: Director of the Office of Child Care</p> <p>Steven Hicks mentioned to the council that the position of the Director of the Office of Child Care will be restructured to have the position oversee all branches within the division, not just Office of Child Care. Steven welcomed any and all suggestions for hire once the position is posted.</p> <p>Cyndi Lessner: Branch Chief for Collaboration and Program Improvement Branch</p> <p>ARPA Grant</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Rene Williams and her team for the ARPA funds are working on quality checks at this time. They have been working to distribute all funding and are checking for underpays, overpays, and any other issues regarding the grant funds. Steven Hicks has been working with the finance office to look at the remaining funds from the stabilization grant so that those can be evenly distributed. The Division of Early Childhood also received 50 million of stabilization funds from the governor's office. The Division is working with the grants office on all logistics to make sure the funding is distributed to as many childcare providers as possible. <p>Stabilization Grant 193 Million</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Division of Early Childhood has increased the provider reimbursement rate on the tuition for Child Care Scholarship from the 60th percentile to the 70th percentile using the funds provided to the Division. The Child Care Scholarship program will also be eliminating or reducing the parent copay required with the assistance of additional funding. There will be a small copay for those that don't qualify under the new benefits. The Child Care Scholarship program will also increase the income eligibility from 65% of state median income to 75% of state median income. The Division also wants to bring back Maryland EXCELS bonuses back as well as increase credentialing bonuses with the additional funding.

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	<p>Pre-K Expansion grants and the Pre-K state Program</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● There were a total of 93 applications submitted for the Pre-K expansion grant and the Pre-K state program. ● Maryland state pre-kindergarten program received 32 applicants. ● The Pre-K expansion grant received 61 applicants. ● Of the 32 applicants, 15 were scored and 11 were awarded grants for maryland State Pre-Kindergarten program ● Of the 61 applicants, 58 were scored and 46 were awarded the Pre-K State program. ● This is due to the fact that the grants are very competitive and have rigorous guidelines that must be met by all applicants. ● Letters have been sent to those who will receive the grant award. ● We would like to work on in the fall having seminars for providers with assistance from the grants office to help with writing grants, making sure that providers understand the process. So that more providers can apply for the grant and can be awarded the grant.
<p>Maryland Legislation 2022</p>	<p>HB 89/SB 480: Asks for continuation of Child Care Stabilization Grants. This was the grant Steven was speaking about earlier and what funding is being used for in the childcare community.</p> <p>HB 513: Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation Program-Established. There was an additional 2 million added to funding.</p> <p>HB 664: Child Care Programs-Maryland Infants and Toddlers Program-Information and Assistance. (Previously the developmental screening bills)</p> <p>HB 467: Education- Teacher Certification-Montessori Schools. Speaks about If an individual has completed an approved Montessori education course and has a bachelor's degree, they may be eligible for a state teaching certificate.</p>
<p>Old Business</p>	<p>Chris Peusch mentioned that there are still concerns regarding the Maryland Blueprint and requirements set forth for Childcare. Chris P. suggested a committee needs to be created to review some of the guidelines and requirements set in the Maryland Blueprint. Chris P. would reach out to committee members to organize a workgroup.</p>
<p>New Business Identifying Priorities</p>	<p>Overview:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Stabilization Grant, Maryland Excels Bonuses, Credentialing Bonuses, Child Care Scholarship ● Workforce shortages ● Council and guests discussed priorities, agenda and topics related to equity and the challenges to participate/meet percentages recommended in the Blueprint as a community based provider of mixed delivery public pre k, especially for family child care. ● The Council and guests engaged in discussion about possible regulation changes relevant to non-public nursery schools and including family child care as a step to addressing challenges and equity. A vote was taken to quickly form a subcommittee to research and

	<p style="text-align: center;">Child Care Scholarship Branch</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Increase in Income Eligibility Scale <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ From 65% of State Median Income (SMI) to 75% of SMI ● Increase in Child Care Provider Reimbursement <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ From up to the 60th percentile of provider reimbursement based on the Child Care Provider Market Rate Survey (MRS) to the 70th percentile of the MRS <p style="text-align: center;">Maryland EXCELS</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● In April 2022, 82% of all licensed child care programs and 56% of all registered family child care homes are participating in Maryland EXCELS. ● Since January 2022, 34 Maryland EXCELS programs have published first time quality 3, 4, or 5 ratings. ● Maryland EXCELS Bonuses will be awarded in FY2023 for programs who publish a first time quality rating, a higher quality rating, and republish a quality rating 5. Be on the lookout for more information ● Continuous Quality Improvement Visits are being conducted by Maryland EXCELS Quality Assurance Specialists. Visits are scheduled and provide Maryland EXCELS quality rated 1, 2, and 3 programs an opportunity to receive feedback and resources for ongoing program improvement from their Quality Assurance Specialists. ● Maryland EXCELS Toolkit has a new look and new resources.
